


MAINE is in the New England region of the United States with a population of 1.3 million residents. It is known for it scenery and for the outstanding seafood cuisine, especially the Lobster, which is featured n several of the pins issued for the state. Maine was a part of Massachusetts until 1820 when it was admitted to the Union. The capital is Augusta. The **Portland** Lions Club was the first in the state and that occurred in 1923.














Reduced image to fit in this space. This one does NOT have "MAINE" on the lobster.

NOTE: The 1962 red lobster is an excellent Example of the ingenuity of the Lions in the early days of pin trading. The Department of Sea & Shore Fisheries for the State of Maine, as shown on the card to the right, issued the novelty pin as a public relations item. To give the Lions from Maine something to trade at the LCI convention in Nice, France, they obtained hundreds of these plastic lobsters, which proved to be extremely popular.







Until 2007, Maine was a part of District 41, which included, in Canada. Newfoundland, St. Pierre ET Miquelon, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and the state of Maine in the US. In 2007 the areas in Canada were incorporated into the newly organized MD N. Maine became SD 41. In the early days, MD 41 made their own MD pin. Maine also made a pin at the whim of whomever the sitting District Governor was. There were several factions of Past District Governors in Maine who felt they had the right to issue the state pin. This is why there are so many different Maine pins. Most all of these were traded at conventions as State pins. As pin traders, we knew we had to get both because there was always arguments as to which was the actual state pin. Over the years the pins shown on pages 1 through 4 have evolved by collectors as the "official" state pins.
