Miscellaneous Pins



NOTE: These pins were originally issued by the Cheyenne Lions Club in Wyoming. When they were issued other pin traders in Wyoming had additional pins made and traded them as MD pins at the international conventions in the early 70's as if they were MD pins. These pins are in most collections as MD Pins as they were traded as such. For the true collectors of Wyoming pins, there are highly desirable and will bring attractive prices in most pin auctions.



NOTE: This pin, which has the "WYOMING" inscription (gold lettering in the middle of the green field), was actually issued by the Moorcroft Lions Club in Wyoming. Once again, it was traded by the pin traders from Wyoming as a State pin. Many of our members who attended the LCI conventions in the early 1970's value this pin in their collections.



NOTE: Although this set of pins clearly indicates "WYOMING" on the danglers, they were actually made and traded by PDGs from Wyoming. These two widely-known Lions back in the 1970's, were about the only two active traders in the entire State and they needed trading material when they attended LCI conventions. To this date, many established pin traders throughout Lionism have these pins in their collections and consider them to be a part of their Wyoming segment.
